Christmas break is here already! Where has the year gone? It has been an interesting first half of the year to say the least. This COVID -19 pandemic has the world upside down it seems. I have had many learning experiences just as our students have. With the staff and students that we have, it makes things so much easier for everyone involved.

I want to remind everyone that there are several places to find out if school has been cancelled due to inclement weather. The local TV stations should display this information. KCTV5, KMBC-TV9, FOX4 - WDAF-TV and KSHB-TV on channel 41 are all included, as well as their affiliates. That means the following channels should have school closing information: 4, 5, 9, 38, and 41. There are also several radio stations that announce school closings, including KDKD Radio (95.3 FM, 1280 AM, and 104.9 FM) and KMOE (92.1 FM). A third location for Ballard School closing announcements is our school web site,

which is <u>www.ballardr2.net</u> as well as the Ballard Facebook account. Also if you are included in the Remind celly account you will get a text stating the cancelation. Please keep in mind that whether school is cancelled or not, there are always disagreements on the decision. My philosophy on school closings due to weather is quite simple: when in doubt, error on the side of safety, which means cancel. The last thing we want is to risk the safety of the students or staff members here at Ballard. If you have any questions or concerns about this information, please contact me at any time.

Another item of interest that I believe the community needs to be aware of is the filing dates for the next School Board election. The filing dates for any individuals interested in running for a Board position are from December 15, 2020 through January 19, 2021. The two seats that will be up for election are currently held by Ian Meade and Nathaniel Wainscott. The election will be held on April 6, 2021. Filing information and paperwork can be acquired from and returned to Kerri Loyd during school hours (8:00 a.m. - 4:00 p.m.) and up to 5:00 p.m. on January 19th. If interested, you may file during normal school business time. Feel free to contact me or Mrs. Loyd if you have any questions about this process.

Eight-year-old Virginia O'Hanlon wrote a letter to the editor of New York's *Sun*, and the quick response was printed as an unsigned editorial Sept. 21, 1897. The work of veteran newsman Francis Pharcellus Church has since become history's most reprinted newspaper editorial, appearing in part or whole in dozens of languages in books, movies, and other editorials, and on posters and stamps.

DEAR EDITOR: I am 8 years old.

Some of my little friends say there is no Santa Claus. Papa says, 'If you see it in THE SUN it's so.' Please tell me the truth; is there a Santa Claus?

VIRGINIA O'HANLON. 115 WEST NINETY-FIFTH STREET.

VIRGINIA, your little friends are wrong. They have been affected by the skepticism of a skeptical age. They do not believe unless they see. They think that nothing can be which is not comprehensible by their little minds. All minds, Virginia, whether they be men's or children's, are little. In this great universe of ours man is a mere insect, an ant, in his intellect, as compared with the boundless world about him, as measured by the intelligence capable of grasping the whole of truth and knowledge.

Yes, VIRGINIA, there is a Santa Claus. He exists as certainly as love and generosity and devotion exist, and you know that they abound and give to your life its highest beauty and joy. Alas! how dreary would be the world if there were no Santa Claus. It would be as dreary as if there were no VIRGIN-IAS. There would be no childlike faith then, no poetry, no romance to make tolerable this existence. We should have no enjoyment, except in sense and sight. The eternal light with which childhood fills the world would be extinguished.

Not believe in Santa Claus! You might as well not believe in fairies! You might get your papa to hire men to watch in all the chimneys on Christmas Eve to catch Santa Claus, but even if they did not see Santa Claus coming down, what would that prove? You may tear apart the baby's rattle and see what makes the noise inside, but there is a veil covering the unseen world which not the strongest man, nor even the united strength of all the strongest men that ever lived, could tear apart. Only faith, fancy, poetry, love, romance, can push aside that curtain and view and picture the supernal beauty and glory beyond. Is it all real? Ah, VIRGINIA, in all this world there is nothing else real and abiding.

No Santa Claus! Thank God! he lives, and he lives forever. A thousand years from now, Virginia, nay, ten times ten thousand years from now, he will continue to make glad the heart of childhood.



In our Physical Science class, we are learning about the pH scales, acids, bases, and neutrals. We did an experiment to test the pH of different fluids. First, we made an indicator solution by steeping red cabbage in water. It started out blue, but slowly turned purple. Then, we brought in different solutions to test their pH, such as coffee, pickle juice, dish soap, and milk. We then filled test tubes with the indicator solution. Afterwards, we added the testing fluid into each tube. Based on the color the indicator solution changed to, we were able to determine the pH. Pickle juice is around a 1-2 and is an acid. Milk is about an 11 and is a base. This experiment taught us a lot about the pH scale and determining acids and bases.

Hello fellow mathematicians,

The answers to the last edition of Math Corner are at the end of this edition.

Elementary Riddle (K-4):

Q. I found a box of ornaments in my basement. When I opened it up, all of them were blue except for six, and all of them were green, except for six, and all of them were red, except for six. How many of each color ornament were in the box?

Middle School Riddle (5-8):

Q. Santa has 9 reindeer (if you count Rudolph). If Santa, the sleigh, and all the presents weigh a literal ton, how much weight does each reindeer need to pull to distribute the weight evenly?

High School Riddle (9-12):

Q. The distance from pole to pole around the world is 24,901 miles. At what average rate would Santa need to fly to go from pole to pole in one night (assume "night" is defined as 10 PM to 5 AM)

Elementary Riddle (K-4):

Q. Imagine you are at Thanksgiving dinner with two other people. A fresh pie just came out of the oven, and you want to share it equally between the three of you. How can you cut it using straight across lines so that you all get equal amounts of pie?

A. Cut the pie into six equal slices, and each person gets two slices.

Middle School Riddle (5-8):

Q. You are traveling for Thanksgiving to visit your Gran Gran in Texas. On a map from your house to hers, is 5cm. The map has a scale of 1 cm = 135 mi.

Part 1: how far is it to Gran Gran's house from your house?

1 Corner

Part 2: If you drive an average speed of 75mi/hr, and leave at 6:00AM, when will you arrive at her house?

A. If 1 cm = 135 mi, and you measure 5cm, just take $5 \times 135 \text{ mile} = 675 \text{ miles}$. To find the time you will get there, first determine how long it takes to drive 675 miles going 75mi/hr. To do this, just divide 675 by 75, which equals 9 hours. So 9 hours from 6:00AM would be 3:00PM.

High School Riddle (9-12):

Q. Same question as Middle School, but I want to add: your car gets 20mpg and has an 18 gallon gas tank. If gasoline is \$1.72/gal, and you are on empty, how much will it cost in gas to drive to Gran Gran's house and back?

A. First of all, the miles to and from Gran Gran's house are 1,350 miles. 20mpg means that my car travels 20 miles per gallon of gas, so I take 1,350 divided by 20 to find how many gallons of gas I need, which results in 67.5 gallons of gas. The size of the tank doesn't matter, all that matters is that we are starting at 0 gallons and having to purchase enough to go 1,350 miles. To find the cost of 67.5 gallons at \$1.72/gal, we just multiply 67.5 times 1.72, which results in \$116.10. Small price to pay to see Gran Gran, I'm sure.
